Course Overview:

Units of Study

Unit 1: Sculpture

- Duration: 4 weeks
- Key Concepts: Three-dimensional forms, carving, modeling, additive and subtractive techniques, texture, volume, space.
- Activities:
 - o Create a sculpture using clay or papier-mâché.
 - Explore additive (building up) and subtractive (removing material) sculpture techniques.
 - o Study famous sculptors (e.g., Michelangelo, Henry Moore) and discuss their contributions.
 - o Analyze the use of positive and negative space in sculptures.

Unit 2: Painting

- **Duration**: 4 weeks
- Key Concepts: Color theory, composition, brushwork, texture, layering, medium (watercolor, acrylic, etc.).
- Activities:
 - Create a still-life or landscape painting using watercolors or acrylic paints.
 - Study the color wheel, primary, secondary, and tertiary colors, and how to mix them.
 - Experiment with different painting techniques (e.g., wet-on-wet, dry brushing).
 - o Analyze famous painters (e.g., Claude Monet, Pablo Picasso) and discuss their stylistic choices.

Unit 3: Design

- Duration: 4 weeks
- **Key Concepts**: Visual communication, typography, layout, pattern, symmetry, asymmetry.
- Activities:
 - Create a graphic design project (poster, book cover, etc.).
 - Explore principles of design such as balance, contrast, emphasis, and rhythm.
 - Learn the difference between functional design and art.
 - o Study influential designers (e.g., Saul Bass, Paul Rand) and their use of design elements.

Unit 4: Crafts

- Duration: 3 weeks
- **Key Concepts**: Texture, craftsmanship, functional art, cultural significance, mixed media.
- Activities:
 - Create a handmade functional item (e.g., pottery, woven basket, or sewn piece).
 - Explore traditional crafts from various cultures.
 - Discuss the importance of craft in historical and contemporary art.

Unit 5: Drawing

- **Duration**: 4 weeks

- Activities:

 - Experiment with various drawing tools (pencil, charcoal, ink).
 - Study the works of famous draftspersons (e.g., Leonardo da Vinci, Albrecht Dürer).
 - o Explore the techniques of shading, hatching, and cross-hatching.

Elements and Principles of Art

Throughout the course, students will integrate the following **Elements of Art** and **Principles of Design** into their projects:

Elements of Art:

- Line: The path of a moving point, used in drawing and painting.
- Shape: A 2D area defined by lines or other elements.
- Form: A 3D shape with depth, volume, and mass.
- **Space**: The area around, between, and within objects in an artwork.
- **Texture**: The surface quality that can be seen or felt.
- Value: The lightness or darkness of a color.
- Color: The result of light reflecting off a surface and being interpreted by the eye.

Principles of Design:

- **Balance**: The distribution of visual weight in an artwork.
- Contrast: The difference between elements (light/dark, large/small) that creates visual interest.
- **Emphasis**: The focal point or area of importance in an artwork.
- Movement: The suggestion of motion within an artwork.
- Pattern: The repetition of shapes, lines, or colors.
- Rhythm: The repetition of elements that creates a sense of flow or movement.
- Unity: The sense of harmony and wholeness in an artwork.
